KOB Programs

ENVIRONMENTAL EDUCATION PROGRAMS

Engaging learners of all ages to inspire lifelong environmental stewardship

KOB connects people to the natural world through:

- » Environmental education curriculum for K-12 youth
- » Classroom resources and professional development for educators
- » Learning events for community groups and the general public

In 2024:

- » 14,921 youth and adults participated in KOB Environmental Education programs and events
- » KOB engaged 4,840 students in grades K-12 during 244 classroom and out-of-school-time programs that featured cross-curricular, STEM-focused activities
- » KOB hosted 29 professional development workshops, certifying 388 educators who will reach an additional 43,390 students over the next 12 months





POLLUTION PREVENTION PROGRAMS

Enhancing and protecting our community's natural spaces, waterways, and ecosystems

KOB helps reduce the negative consequences of pollution by:

- » Coordinating volunteers and hosting service projects
- » Providing learning resources for the general public
- » Engaging community members in environmental stewardship initiatives

In 2024:

- » 5,574 KOB volunteers dedicated 12,280+ hours of service, which equals a \$290,000 benefit to our community
- » Community volunteers and Adopt-a-Spot groups held 400 cleanup events, removing 2,798 bags and 37,500+ pounds of litter from public spaces
- » Volunteers in KOB's Healthy Waterways program cleaned and marked storm drains with "No Dumping" decals, to promote awareness and prevent water pollution





KOB Programs



WASTE REDUCTION AND RECYCLING EDUCATION

Helping residents make informed, sustainable choices about the environmental impacts of waste

KOB encourages individual participation and inspires a sense of collective impact through initiatives that reduce waste and contamination, including:

- » Creating and distributing online resources, videos, and how-to guides
- » Hosting in-person events and presentations
- » Promoting waste-reduction and recycling education through advertising

In 2024:

- » The Reduce. Reuse. Recycle Right public education campaign yielded 7,381,086 impressions and drove 80,945 engagements to online resources
- » KOB's recycling, composting, and waste-reduction webpages received 55,653 visitors
- » 5,882 youth and adult participants engaged in KOB waste reduction and recycling activities through in-person programs and events

TREE CANOPY IMPROVEMENT INITIATIVES

Planting diverse trees in public spaces to expand and increase the resiliency of Omaha's tree canopy

KOB engages our community in planting events and educational opportunities to promote the benefits of urban trees, including:

- » Utilizing trees to improve access to healthy greenspaces
- » Reducing urban heat-island effects and improving well being
- » Increasing biodiversity to strengthen tree canopy resilience against future pests and environmental changes

In 2024:

- » A new and expanded tree-planting program, Trees for Tomorrow, was established as a public-private partnership between KOB, the City of Omaha, and private donors
- » KOB planted a total of 485 trees throughout 19 public spaces, including Omaha parks, trails, public school grounds, and along Sorensen Parkway
- » The Trees for Tomorrow school program was conducted at three public schools, engaging 265 students in environmental education curriculum, and adding 32 native trees on school campuses





Additional Accomplishments



The largest cleanup event of 2024 was conducted by 278 youth and adult volunteers at Levi Carter Park, where 69 bags and more than 2,300 pounds of litter were cleaned from the lakeshore and surrounding area.

In partnership with Omaha Stormwater, KOB held rain barrel workshops for 48 households. Workshops included free, hands-on installation resources and education to help prevent stormwater pollution.

KOB expanded by adding three part-time staff members in 2024. The team welcomed two new environmental educators and a volunteer coordinator.

KOB's new *Trees for Tomorrow* program kicked off with a community-planting event at Ta-Ha-Zouka Park. More than 100 youth and adult volunteers from the Elkhorn community celebrated recovery from the April tornado by planting 75 trees in the park. Since 2018, KOB's Tree Canopy Improvement initiatives have added more than 4,050 diverse and native trees throughout 118 public spaces in Omaha.

KOB held successful Giving Tuesday and Year-End fundraising campaigns, and attained record revenue for its annual golf tournament. There was 100% participation from the Board of Directors and KOB staff to make a financial donation and/or in-kind contribution to our organization.

KOB's summer youth programming was nonstop!
Environmental educators provided weekly programming for five different summer programs. Additionally, KOB held family programming at Learning Community Center of South Omaha, and trained summer camp staff at four locations throughout the city.

In November 2024, KOB testified in support of the City of Omaha Climate Action and Resilience Plan. The plan was approved by the City Council and signed by the mayor, serving as a strategic guide for future decisions. It outlines how the City of Omaha, its residents, private businesses, and organizations can reduce human impact and enhance resilience to climate change.


